On Thursday 4 May 2023, local elections are taking place within North Kesteven.

To vote at a polling station, you will need photo ID with you. A wide range of photo ID will be accepted, including passports, driving licences, bus passes and cards with a PASS Mark.

If you don't have what's needed, you can apply for a free voter ID document known as a Voter **Authority Certificate**



LETTER FROM REV. ANDREW VAUGHAN

Hello

As I settle my mind to writing this piece we are having a dip in temperature after some nicer weather, a reminder that the journey from winter to spring and then to summer is never a smooth path, but that there is light at the end of the tunnel.

Perhaps this is why it is so apt that we celebrate the hope of Easter at this time of year. In the story of the betrayal, crucifixion and then resurrection we see that the journey to hope and new life has darkness as well as light.

Our services for Holy Week and Easter will hopefully help us experience that journey. The week will start with our Palm Sunday Procession from Eagle Village Hall into church, the dramatic reading of the story of the crucifixion. This will start at 10.30am on April 2nd. We will then have short services throughout the week at 7pm. Then on Thursday we will have our Maundy Thursday communion and stripping of the altar, a reminder of the darkness and desolation of that night. On Good Friday we will have our 10am Family Service and Hot Cross Buns at North Scarle followed by the Hour Before the Cross at 2pm in Eagle.

The culmination will be our Easter Day Service. This will be at 10.30am in Thorpe. This year we will have the Blessing of the Easter light, the first communion of Easter and the Baptism of twins. Easter Day was the traditional day for Baptism in the early church, with the 40 days of Lent as a period of preparation.

Please do come and join us at any or all of these services, after the last 3 years we need to come together as a wider community to celebrate.

Finally, Easter opens us to be people of hope and change, how do we translate that into living in our world which at times feels so negative, hopeless and without purpose?

General Information.

A precept of £21,961 was agreed which equated to a 16.69% increase for the year 2023/2024 (monetary terms £10.82 annual increase band D property)

A commemorative tree has been donated to the Parish Council which has now been planted at the Playing Field.

Damon Blackband, the Sustrans Regional Network Development Manager for Lincolnshire, recently attended the Parish Council meeting where he gave a small presentation about his role in and around Lincolnshire.

His job is to make cycle routes more accessible and safer for the public to use. The route from Eagle – Harby on the last inspection had been graded as dangerous, due to traffic and road conditions. He is going to carry out a feasibility study to identify ways in which the route can be made safer and then implement the recommendations. The project would take approx. 12/18 months to implement, with funds & management coming from central government. The Parish Council welcomed the project and are keen to support it, welcoming any recommendations for improving the cycle network.

Elections

The parish Council asked Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership to consider installing a school crossing patrol on Scarle Lane after a request from a parent of the school, please see the findings of the report below -

Our colleagues in the Education Team have been out to assess the location.

In terms of the parking, there were 5 or 6 vehicles parking on Scarle Lane, but they were away from the school site due to the School Safety Zone area. So, none that were blocking visibility or causing any issues. Some parents used Hill Top Close and walked down and crossed the road.

The School Safety Zone and advisory 20mph speed limit seems to be doing its job and there is a crossing point identified within it that parents and children use. With no vehicles parking here, the visibility is good and traffic speed quite low. Approx 25 children crossed the road, all with parents. This figure is quite low when compared to many other sites and the fact that all were accompanied means that the criteria for a School Crossing Patrol is not met.

In terms of measures, the existing layout is good, and I know that you have a reactive speed sign on the approach. Also, the parents seem to respect the School Safety Zone and park sensibly and accompany their children across the road to the school site. So, all in all, the location wouldn't warrant anything further at the moment. Our education colleagues do go into the school and offer road safety advice and training to the staff and children from time to time.

The reactive speed sign on Scarle Lane is currently out of order, and is being sent away to be repaired.

The Vicar recently received this letter from David Foster

Village Life in Wartime Britain

On 9th November 1940, my mother, brother Alan and I self-evacuated from Richmond-on-Thames to the village of Eagle, eight miles south west of Lincoln.

Richmond had got off comparatively lightly from the bombs up till then, but I was hobbling about on crutches after being knocked off my bike by a lorry, so my father thought it best if we went to live with my mother's Aunt Fanny at her home in Eagle, where we remained for the duration. My father stayed in London where he worked as a civil servant but came to visit us two or three times a year.

Alan and I cycled from Lincoln Station to Eagle, accompanied by a lady called Mrs Bean, while my mother took the bus.

Auntie Fanny lived in a large house called the Haunted House. Why it had this name we boys didn't know and didn't enquire at the time, but we found out much later, as I shall explain.

The house had fourteen rooms, including three in an attached annexe. One room was used exclusively for storing apples – there were 30 apple trees in the large garden, 25 of them Cox's Orange Pippins.

Mr Bean looked after the garden (we always thought his name was singularly appropriate!) There being no running water, his duties included clearing out the privy. This facility was located in a separate shack and was referred to as "Down the garden". Drinking water came from an attractive wooden pump outside the back door.

We had only been there a few weeks when a Hampden bomber from one of the local airfields crashed about a quarter of a mile away. There was a huge explosion from a landmine it was carrying – much louder than anything we'd heard in London. We all had to evacuate for the night to the village hall in nearby North Hykeham. Fortunately, the only damage to Aunt Fanny's house was a few broken windows. But nothing was mentioned to us boys about the six young men – in their late teens or early twenties who would have been blown to smithereens on that aircraft.

Eagle had a population of about 250 people, and after we'd been there a couple of years, we knew about 245 of them – there was little moving house during the war years.

Aunt Fanny's late husband, Uncle Walter, had been headmaster of the village school – there was only one other teacher. He must have been something of a scholar – as well as a four volume Bible Commentary, his large library included a set of about 8 large volumes of the Cambridge History of

English Literature, which I sold to Heffers of Cambridge in the early 1950s for £10 for the set – probably about £200 in today's money.

My brother and I went to school in Lincoln on the 8 o'clock bus. On the way home, a newsvendor walked up and down the bus station selling the "Lincolnshire Echo" with the clarion call "Echo! Echo! – the more you read, the more you wonder till it makes you fairly gasp" – words I was able to use occasionally in my sermons in my days as a Reader at St. Peter's, Elworth.

There was an earlier bus which left the village at 7am taking mostly men not working on the farms to work in the factories in Lincoln, where they made all sorts of war materials. Some of the women from the village went to work on the later bus – my mother had a job at Millett's. I believe it was the very first of the Millett's shops – I remember my mother complaining that the proprietor, Mr Bernard Millett, was a mean old thing!

Eagle at the time sported two shops and a Post Office. There were three farms, each about 250 acres. It was mixed farming, the emphasis on arable, being Lincolnshire. The main crops were wheat, oats, barley and sugar beet, the last because of difficulties in importing sugar cane. We used to help out on one of the farms during the holidays. We didn't much like the potato picking – too much like hard work – but helping with the harvest was much more enjoyable, especially making corn stacks. I can remember the farmer allowing me, aged 16, to lead a horse carrying a load of corn from about one and a half miles away, completely unsupervised!

In Richmond we used to sing in St John's Church Choir which had 22 boys (I wonder if my initials carved in the Choir stall are still there?) and were members of the associated Scout Troop. The Scoutmaster, who was also a Church Server wrote to my mother urging her not to let us join a "backwater choir" as my brother had a very fine singing voice. What a snob, we thought! However, we did join the choir at Eagle Church, which then consisted of Alan and I and another boy called Maurice, a flat-footed man called Sam, who sang the melody line an octave lower, old Mr Tindall, who sang a cracked tenor, Mrs Mary Rose on the organ, and Sam's son Ken, the organ blower. We weren't King's College Cambridge, but we did our best!

The attractive oak screen between the nave and the chancel was given by Aunt Fanny in memory of her husband. The congregation was about 30 in number, with the vicar's wife and daughter in the front row, and a retired bank manager sitting in splendid isolation in the side aisle.

The Vicar was a very nice man who preached a very traditional type of sermon, although as boys we did think he rather droned on at times. (What a good job today's Vicars aren't like that!) But some things did stick. I remember to this day the Vicar preaching from 1 Corinthians 16: 13 (AV) "Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit ye like men, be strong", especially his re-iteration of the phrase "quit ye like men".

There were also two boys from Hull. One lived with Mr & Mrs Bean and the other at our friend Maurice's home next door to the Beans.

We played cricket on a field between the church and the school – the footpath crossing the pitch wasn't too much of an impediment! We also greatly enjoyed climbing a large oak tree on the edge of the field.

We had a football team – we called ourselves Eagle Wanderers – and played against teams from neighbouring villages. A farmer kindly allowed us to use one of his fields – we chopped down one or two young birch trees from a nearby wood for goal posts.

A highlight of the social scene was the monthly whist drive (boring!) and dance – quick step, foxtrot, waltz and hokey-cokey. We often got local RAF bands, mostly saxophones. Failing that, it was me on the piano and another boy on the drums.

Then there was the annual garden fete at the Vicarage (including bowls on the lawn), and the Scouts and Guides annual show in the school.

So, what about the Haunted House? Well, remarkably, after losing touch with our friend Maurice after about 65 years, we met up again, and he told me that Uncle Walter had given it that name to discourage local youths from stealing his apples ('scrumping' as it was called). Well, what do you know!

We have also installed new bike racks to replace those removed when the old portacabin was knocked down then turned into an outdoor gym and seating area. As well as replacing an old shed with a much better storage solution for all of our outdoor toys. Now, the instructions said "easily put together in one hour with just four people"! Given how heavy the sections of the container were and how difficult it was to carry it onsite, we didn't really believe these instructions ... but, thanks to some willing parent volunteers it was put together relatively easily (though probably some aching muscles afterwards).

Reading – a Habit for Life Everyone at our school knows how much we value the importance of reading and we simply love books! The more you read, the more every other subject and skill is opened up. For example, when one young lady found her favourite series of books to read, the quality of her own writing developed as she started to understand authorial technique and began to apply this in her own work! Another young chap, when asked about his best Christmas present, waxed lyrical about a new book he had been gifted ... ahead of all the other things! Anyway, to keep adding to these examples of

reading success, Mr Watson re-organised our free-reading library (with the able assistance of some helpful librarians Vinnie, Rylan and Thomas) and added some donations to provide new ranges that might just be the 'right fit' for some to read.

School Inspection In January, His Majesty's Inspectorate visited us to decide if the school remains the same grade as previously graded. The staff worked relentlessly in-and-out of meetings all day and the children were AMAZING and their pride made us so proud!!! We are


So much done, achieved and learnt in our Spring programme and the young people are all working towards the top awards in Scouting!



recently decided to sell televisions, which were a new and rare thing in 1953.

As not many people had a TV, or access to one, Bert asked the then Reverend, Mr MacCartney, if he could install a television in Eagle Church so that the Queen's Coronation could be watched by the villagers, as it was broadcast live from London.

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
